



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Year 1: George Stephenson - North East Engineer and Inventor

As part of our Spring Term Curriculum Project, Year 1 have been learning about North East engineer and inventor George Stephenson, also known as the 'Father of Railways'.

Year 1 spent some time studying Stephenson's famous locomotive 'Rocket' as we learnt about its great victory in The Rainhill trials. The children then put their drawing skills to the test as they created some very impressive charcoal drawings of the renowned locomotive. During art and DT lessons, Year 1 enjoyed working together to make a large version of the Rocket. We can't wait for you to see it at the school exhibition!

We were then lucky enough to go on an exciting visit to Stephenson Steam Railway to explore the stories of George and Robert Stephenson and the impact of their work in developing the railways. At the museum, we got to meet Killingworth Billy, the third oldest surviving locomotive in the world! We took our time whilst doing some impressive observational drawings of Billy.











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Year 1/2: North East coast

Year 1/2's local project is based around our beautiful coastline. In Art, we were inspired by Van Gogh's 'Fishing Boats on the Beach at Sainte-Marie-de-la-Mer' and created our own beach artwork using different textures and materials. Alongside this, the children became poets and used their five senses to create their own seaside poems.

We focussed specifically on Grace Darling in History who was a local heroine from over 200 years ago. We took a trip up to Bamburgh and visited the Grace Darling Museum where the children took part in a workshop, where we learnt about the Darling family and were able to dress up and role play. We enjoyed our trip so much that the children were inspired to create a fact file about













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Year 2: Local food and history

For our local project in Year 2, we have been learning about a variety of local foods and the history behind some of these foods. We have learnt some really interesting historical facts, such as how stotties were originally made, how Greggs first began and how Singing Hinnies got their name. We have had the opportunity to taste some of the most well– known local foods, including pease pudding, Singing Hinnies, Stotties and sausage rolls. In a later lesson, we were also able to create our own recipe for sausage rolls, which we then followed to make our sausage rolls! We really enjoyed tasting and evaluating these.

As part of our local project, we also took a trip to Eachwick Red House Farm. It was a fantastic day out, and we had a brilliant time learning about the sources of local, everyday foods, including butter. After having a go at making our own butter, we were able to see the process behind where the milk for this comes from, and how much skill goes into caring for the cows that produce this milk. We even visited the milking parlour and saw the process behind milking the cows!

Year 3: Bridges



During the spring term, Year 3 have been learning all about the different bridges along the Tyne River. The children enjoyed visiting the Baltic where they learnt about the history of the river and also the exciting plans for the future of the areas surrounding the river. They enjoyed designing and making their own bridges at The Baltic.

We also learnt about the Millennium Bridge and produced newspaper reports about the day Queen Elizabeth II officially opened it. We also had fun reporting about our amazing day when we got to walk across the Millennium Bridge – for some children, this was their first time on the bridge which was very exciting!

We also researched the many different bridges located along the Tyne and produced some fact sheets about them, including information about when they were built, who opened them. We also looked at different bridge designs and used this knowledge to make our own lolly stick bridges in DT.

We were also fortunate to attend the amazing Live Theatre to participate in a creative writing workshop to produce our very own class book – written entirely by the children. The book was illustrated by professional artist on the day.

Year 3 have also enjoyed learning local songs in music lessons and are building up a good



Some fabulous interpretations of the Pitmen Painters








Visit from an Artist

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Year 5: Victorian Era

As part of our local history project, Year 5 began the term by focusing on what life was like during the Victorian Era in Newcastle. We looked at what life was like and the differences between the rich and the poor. We used a mixture of sources including paintings, novels, diary entries and songs to determine whether we thought people lived a good life and compared this to how we live today.

After we knew what it was like to live during this Era, we were transported to 1854, the time of the Great Fire of Newcastle and Gateshead. We were lucky enough to visit the Discovery Museum to participate in a workshop describing what happened. The children thoroughly enjoyed putting on a puppet show for their peers and using their imagination to describe how it would feel to be there. We were then given the chance to explore the museum, transporting ourselves through the different decades in Newcastle.

Throughout the topic, we created our own Geordie song by writing lyrics and accompanying these with instruments including bells, ukuleles, and drums. We fully immersed ourselves in the topic and have enjoyed singing local songs and using local dialect throughout!










Year 6
